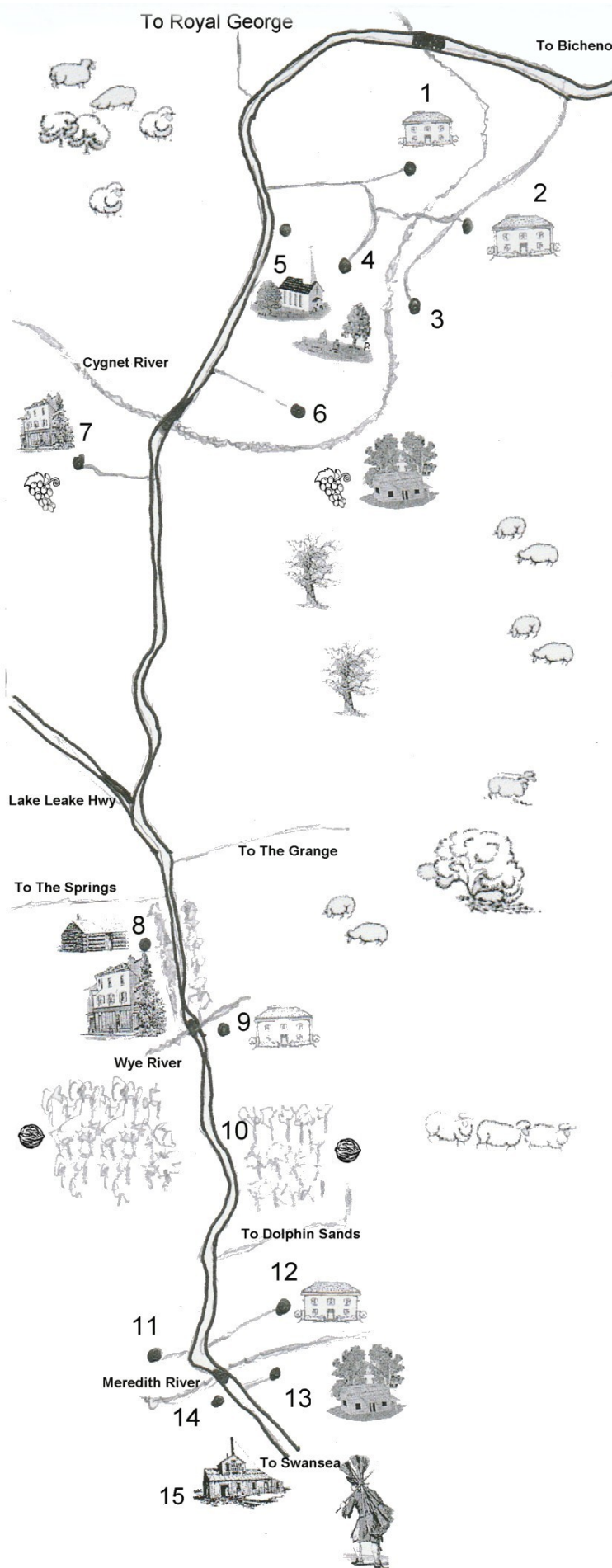


Historic Touring Guide - Cranbrook to Swansea



Please note this list is of private properties. They are not open for public inspection. Those with cellar sales are indicated.

1. Glen Gala – The present house was built in 1860 for Adam AMOS.
2. Craigie Knowe – Built 1842 for James AMOS
3. Cranbrook House – Is a three level house built in 1833 for John AMOS.
4. Gala & Mill – The main house is a single storey of brick with course render. The Mill was built c1840 – AMOS.
5. Gala Kirk – Scottish Kirk in the Romanesque Revival Georgian style built in 1845 for John AMOS snr. Includes the cemetery.
6. Spring Vale – Home of Charles & Louisa Meredith. Built in 1842. In 1862 part of the house was destroyed by fire. – **Cellar Sales**
7. Milton – Originally owned by the ALLEN family. The present house was built early 1900's. – **Cellar Sales**
8. Riversdale & Mill – Was built by the convict 'Old Bull' in 1838 for George MEREDITH. Charles & Louisa lived there for 15 months. The Mill was built by John AMOS.
9. Belmont – Is a simple Victorian house, it was built in 1891-2 by William LECKIE for Arthur COTTON.
10. Walnut Plantation – Webster's have about 600 acres of plantation in the district.
11. Redcliffe – Was originally constructed of weatherboards by convicts in 1835. It housed the labourer's for Meredith.
12. Cambria – Was built by 'Old Bull' for George MEREDITH in 1835-6. Louisa loved the family homestead and spent many hours sketching it.
13. Red Banks – Is a three storey house built in 1847 for Edward Carr SHAW. A fire in 1862 destroyed the rear of the house.
14. Terenure – Was built in 1909 for the SHAW family. It was named after Mr Shaw's birth place in Ireland.
15. Swansea Bark Mill – The first mill on this site was built in 1885 it operated as steam flourmill by William Morey. It was later a Bark Mill.
