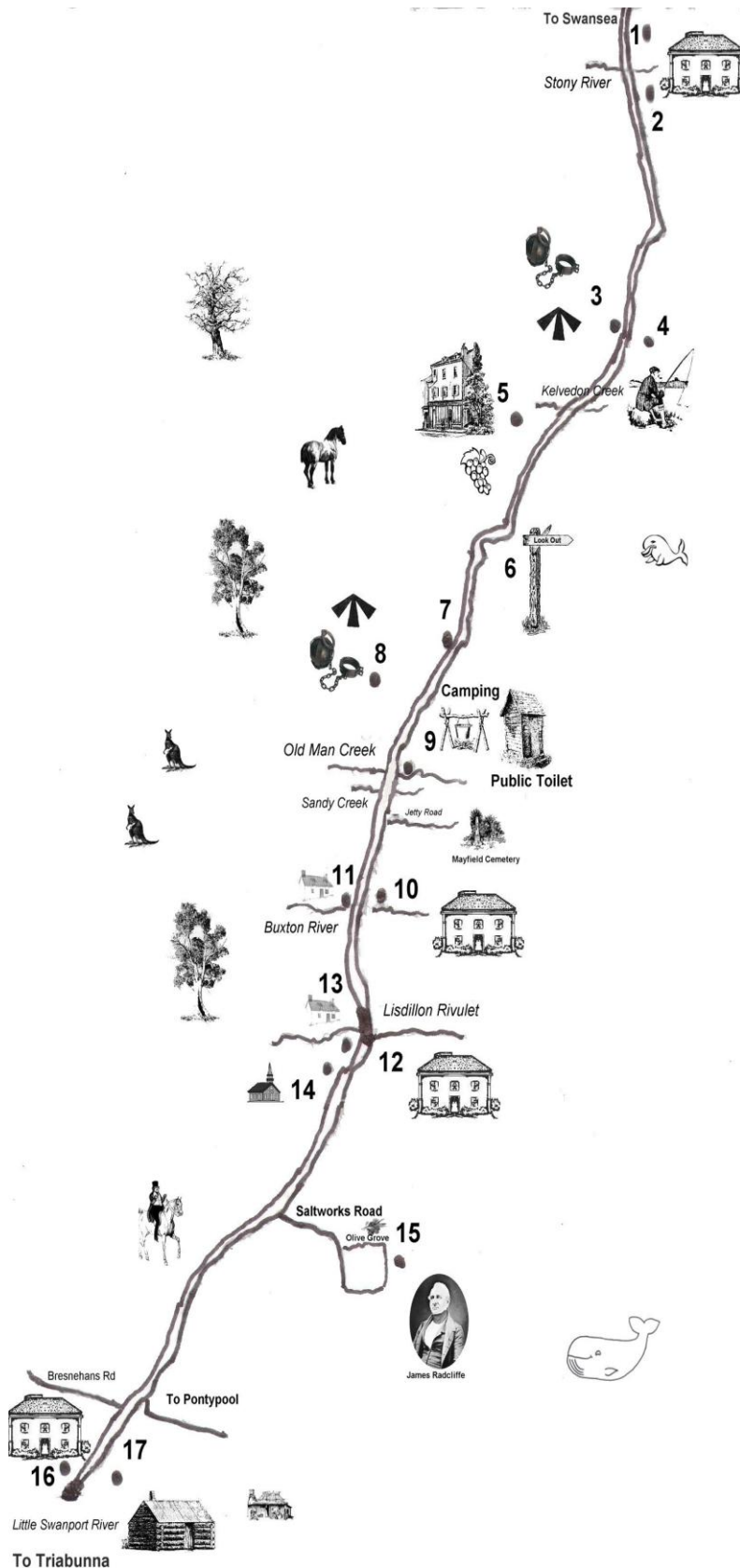


Historic touring guide from Swansea to Little Swanport



Please note: most are private properties and not open for public inspection.

1. Coswell was built c1828 for brothers John & Hugh Addison. In 1855 it was purchased by J.P. King.
2. Piermont was built c1827 for Robert Webber. The present house was built in 1838.
3. Spiky Bridge was built in the 1840's by convicts from the Rocky Hills Probation Station.
4. Spiky Beach Nice walk and viewing of the bay.
5. Kelvedon Built c1830 by convict labour for Francis Cotton.
6. Scenic Lookout over Oyster Bay, The Hazards, Freycinet & Schouten Island.
7. Tirzah Home of Sarah E.E. Mitchell. The present house was built after 1900 for Mrs Edward Castle.
8. Rocky Hills Probation Station From 1841-1848.
9. Mayfield Beach Reserve Toilets & camping facilities.
10. Mayfield Built c1829 by convict labour for Thomas Buxton. The cemetery has members of the Buxton & Mitchell families.
11. Buxton Cottages Built c1870's for the John Mitchell who purchased the estate in 1865.
12. Lisdillon Built c1838 for James Radcliffe who sold it to John Mitchell.
13. Rose Cottage (Part of the Lisdillon Estate) was built c1838. For many years it was the local Post Office.
14. Lisdillon Church (Mitchell Cottage) Built by John Mitchell in 1864. It was a school and a place of worship.
15. Saltworks, Lisdillon Was established by James Radcliffe. It had ceased operation by 1841.
16. Muirland(s) The present house was built after the 1929 when the floods washed away the buildings (included the Swann Inn).
17. Muirland(s) Barn & Cabin Was built c1840's for John Radford who also ran the 'Swan Inn'.
